Warm-up:

Adaptations/Modifications for Students

At differing achievement levels, learning styles, multiple intelligences, language backgrounds of individual students.

Social media posts can be more image-based with fewer words, only one person needs to speak in each group

Pitfalls and Solutions (What could go wrong and how will I handle it?)

Students within groups won't talk: Ask some guiding questions to provoke discussion

Students can't stay on task: Give them a time check, ask if they have a presenter, ask to hear what they have

Tech troubles: Have students draw a graphic and write a caption on paper
