Report Blue Economy Community Leaders

The Institute conducted a customized 8-month comprehensive program with the College of Marin to determine how they could bridge the gap and meet companies' workforce development needs and fulfill student's dreams of green/blue jobs by supplementing their academics. The College has a once-in-a-generation opportunity to become a regional hub for Blue Economy innovation, workforce training, and leadership.

The Challenges

- Students seek sustainable career pathways that lead to good-paying jobs
- CoM has just one course in sustainability and no wet lab.
- CoM's goal is a feeder system for UC System and continuing education.
- Businesses need training certificates in Aquaculture, Clean Water Management, Regenerative Agriculture, Marine Electricity. Companies & have had to search elsewhere for their workforce development training.
- Hog Island hires employees trained at Cal Poly/Humbolt County or Santa Monica Community College then faces affordable housing crisis.
- California has thousands of available jobs in water management.

Strategic Implementation

- Blue Job Shadow Day: This immersive career event with local and national blue companies enlightened students, educators, and academic leaders about the potential of the Blue Economy in the Bay Area.
- Business Survey: local companies shared their needs, projected jobs, challenges, goals and workforce development internships and jobs.
- The **Blue Economy Map** was created as a way imagine a new vision.
- Hosted VIP meeting with business, government, education leaders to explore how we might collaborate to build a Blue Economy.

Program

- The Institute conducted an intensive 10-week paid internship with students to explore Sustainable Career Pathways with entry, mid, and advanced-level jobs projected jobs, salary ranges and education needs.
- Shared the Institute's tools: bio/resume, LinkedIn profile, 5-year plan
- Networking events & interviews with local companies, national experts
- Through their research, interns found these careers are accessible, in demand, and offer living wages that could allow them to live/work here.
